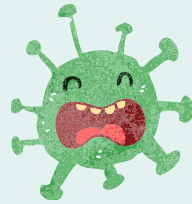
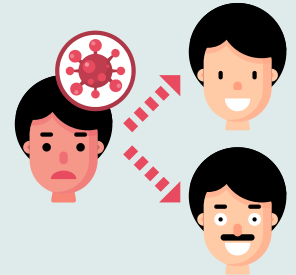


What You Need to Know About COVID-19

Coronavirus, or COVID-19, is a virus that makes people sick.



COVID-19 spreads easily between people.



People with disabilities are more likely to get COVID-19.



COVID-19 can make you have a fever and feel tired and sore. You might have trouble breathing.



People of color are more likely to get COVID-19.

Some people who get COVID-19 get very sick. Some people have to go to the hospital.

People with health problems are more likely to get COVID-19.



Because COVID-19 is so dangerous, it is important for you to get vaccinated.



A vaccine is a medicine that keeps you from getting sick.



The COVID-19 vaccine has been tested to make sure it works and is safe.



After getting the vaccine, you might have a sore arm, feel tired, or have a fever for one or two days. This is normal.



If you have questions about the vaccine, talk to a doctor or nurse.



The COVID-19 vaccine is free.
